Celebrating impact and partnership

Correll Pavilion transforming healthcare for Atlanta

Thanks to the partnership and collaboration of many, Grady's Correll Pavilion was added to the Atlanta skyline in early 2023, marking a new era for our health system. A true public-private partnership, the facility was funded through bonds provided by DeKalb and Fulton Counties and \$96 million in private philanthropic support. This new state-of-the-art outpatient facility features advanced surgical services, outpatient clinics, imaging, and rehabilitation services.

The Correll Pavilion dramatically expands Grady's ability to serve patients, offering 25% more operating room capacity and 45% additional clinic capacity. The new facility is named in honor of A.D. "Pete" Correll, chairman emeritus of Georgia-Pacific and former chair of both the Grady Memorial Hospital Corporation and Grady Health Foundation boards of directors, who passed away in 2021. We are forever grateful to the many supporters who came together to build what is a major advancement in medical care at Grady.

Severely injured firefighter now thriving thanks to Grady's Burn Center

Thanks to Grady, firefighter Frank Barker is able to keep saving lives. In early 2023, this US Army Veteran responded to a house fire that quickly escalated. As the fire raged, Barker found himself trapped and threw himself out of a window to escape a sudden fire surge. While he survived, Barker suffered serious injuries with third-degree burns to 20% of his body. When he arrived at Grady's Walter L. Ingram Burn Center, a dedicated team of highly specialized doctors, nurses, and support staff were waiting for him. The injuries to his left hand were so severe that he feared he'd lose it. Thanks to the expertise of Grady's clinicians, Frank's wounds were treated, and he was able to return to work again.

Ingram Burn Center is **the leading resource for burn care in Atlanta** and **the largest pediatric burn care provider in the metro area.** We are grateful to The Imlay Foundation and many other donors, whose support allows Grady's Burn Center to remain a regional resource for burn care, welcoming patients in need from all across Georgia and surrounding states.

Grady is on a mission to prevent heart disease and provide hope

Betty Johnson, a lifetime Atlanta resident and Grady Baby, knows what it is like to need ongoing care for heart disease, something that impacts far too many in Georgia. Diagnosed with congestive heart failure years ago, Grady has helped Betty manage her condition and was there when the disease worsened. "My lungs started filling with fluid, and I started struggling for my next breath," said Johnson. It was a scary situation for Betty and her family. Thanks to the multidisciplinary team at Grady's Heart & Vascular Center, Betty received expert care and returned home better able to manage



her heart condition. "They made sure I got better," Betty explains. Without Grady and support from donors like you, Betty may not be here today.

Although cardiovascular disease is preventable, it is the leading cause of death in Georgia, contributing to more than 22,000 deaths a year. In both Fulton and DeKalb Counties, Grady's service area, rates of cardiovascular disease are significantly higher than the national average. Grady's Heart & Vascular Center goes beyond the treatment of heart disease – it plays an active role in disease prevention and offers complete cardiovascular care for conditions ranging from heart attacks to hypertension.





Standing ready to save lives

Grady's Marcus Trauma Center one of the busiest, best in the nation

If you find yourself at Grady, you can rest assured that your life is in the hands of the best medical providers in trauma care. In the wake of nearby hospital closures, Grady is caring for more patients than ever, with trauma activations rising 36% since last year. Thanks to investments from the community, we remain strong and ready to care for anyone who comes through our doors. Past generous support from The Marcus Foundation allowed Grady to develop a state-





of-the-art facility, enhancing our role as the state's leading provider of trauma care and ensuring that we were ready for more patients in their time of need.


Grady is innovating new programs to prevent injury and halt the cycle of violence before it begins. The IVYY (Interrupting Violence in Youth and Young Adults) Project at Grady is a violence intervention program, offering wraparound services designed to reduce re-injury. The team works closely with community partners to provide trauma-informed care to interrupt the cycle of violence.

We never give up on hope

Grady's Ponce Center has been impacting lives for 30 years

Chris Harris, a longtime patient at the Ponce Center, recalls receiving an HIV diagnosis in the early days of the epidemic. "They gave me 12 to 14 months to live and told me to get

my affairs in order." He was devastated but determined to live as long as possible for his young daughter. Chris wasn't in the fight alone: the Ponce Center team never gave up on helping him survive and thrive. As a result of the excellent care he received, Chris was able to see his daughter graduate from college. "I was at her wedding. I was able to be at the birthing of my grandchildren. All of these things were not even a dream for me when I was first diagnosed."





Today, over 8,000 patients are served each year with HIV treatment, prevention, and supportive services, making the Ponce Center one of the largest, most comprehensive HIV programs in the nation. Thanks to a remarkable public-private partnership that funded the extensive renovation and expansion of the Ponce Center, Grady is helping even more people access expert clinical care and supportive services. Without Grady, Chris would have missed a lifetime with his family. "We don't treat a disease here. We treat human beings," says Dr. Jonathon Colasanti, Medical Director of Grady's Infectious Disease Program. "This program is a beacon of hope in the community for people from all walks of life...from lawyers and doctors to CEOs."

Atlanta is a better place because of Dr. Phyllis Kozarsky. Her work as a physician, clinical researcher, and teacher spans 35 years. She began her career at Grady's Ponce De Leon Center, and now a new space in the building is dedicated to her service. Mobile Integrated Health for New Moms

Hypertensive disorders complicate 5–10% of pregnancies and are the leading cause of maternal mortality. Grady's Mobile Integrated Health program helps hundreds of moms with hypertensive disorders by continually monitoring them for complications – all from the comfort of their own homes.

Centering Pregnancy

Expectant mothers at Grady get great support from our Centering Pregnancy program that offers a peer-based model of prenatal care integrated with health assessment and education. Participants are less likely to utilize emergency OB services and have a significantly lower percentage of preterm births.



Demand for newborn, maternity care on the rise

Expert prenatal clinicians, remote monitoring, and pregnancy support programs help families thrive

Newborn babies requiring intensive medical attention are often admitted into a special area of Grady called the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU). Because of reduced access to care in other areas of the city, Grady's **newborn deliveries have increased by 40% and NICU volume by 50%.** OB admissions via emergency transports have also increased



from an average of two per day to five or six. Thanks to community support that funded the transformation of the Women's and Infants' Center, we were ready when demand rose. This includes a generous gift from The Zalik Foundation Fund to help expand our NICU by adding specialized care rooms for babies and their families. Continued community support helps to ensure that our smallest patients have a chance at a healthy life.
